Softball To Benefit Big-I Beautification

Efforts to raise money to continue planting trees and shrubs at the I-40 and I-25 interchange continue this weekend with two benefit softball games among local politicians, members of the news media and civic leaders.

The games will be the first played on the city's newest baseball fields at Odelia Pond, just north of the old Albuquerque High School and visible from the southbound lanes of I-25 near the Lomas Avenue exit. The games are organized by the city Parks and Recreation Department, the State Highway Department and Project I, a group promoting the greening of the intersection, known as the Big I. Baseball will be preceded by a dedication of the fields.

The event begins at 4:30 p.m. Tickets are \$25 each, available by calling the Albuquerque Board of Realtors, 842-1433; the Project I office, 881-TREE; or World Wide Tickets, 883-4040. Proceeds will go toward purchasing and maintaining plants at the intersection.

The ticket price includes hot dogs, soft drinks, beer and wine, as well as entertainment by the Watermelon Mountain Jug Band and the Albuquerque Municipal Band.

Stars Gather for Special Olympics

About 20 television and movie actors will take on local media celebrities this weekend to benefit the New Mexico Special Olympics.

The Ben Murphy Celebrity Softball Game will be held tonight at Dukes Stadium and the Celebrity Tennis Tournament will be Saturday and Sunday at the Lobo Club.

While he is not accustomed to leading his name to charity events, television actor Ben Murphy said the response he received last year at the first Albuquerque Celebrity Tennis Tournament for the Special Olympics was so great, he felt the cause was well worth it.

"These kids radiate so much love, you feel good about yourself," he said Thursday after arriving in Albuquerque. "If you do something for them, you get immediate human feedback. And you can't buy that anywhere."

Murphy — who is best known for his roles in the series "Barringers," "Letter," "Alias Smith and Jones" and in the mini-series "Winds of War" — said sports are a good outlet for tension. "When I'm not working," he explained, "tension builds

Italian-Americans Dedicate Monument

Tablet Placed in Columbus Park Commemorates His Discovery of America

Most people may not even remember that it's a holiday weekend until the mailman fails to show up Monday or they try to get money from a bank.

But for Italian-Americans this may be one of the most memorable dates of the year — Columbus Day.

On Saturday the traditional date of the holiday's observance, Albuquerque members of the Order Sons of Italy, with help from the Albuquerque Municipal Band and city officials, dedicated a monument to the Italian explorer.

Appropriately, it was placed in Columbus Park, at Guadalupe Trail and Douglas MacArthur Road NW.

"I'm happy, very happy," said Ernest Montiletto, a member of Albuquerque Lodge No. 2565 of the Order Sons of Italy, during the ceremonies.

The marble tablet — set in a 2-foot-high cement block — commemorates Christopher Columbus' discovery of America, perhaps the greatest contribution by an Italian to America's history, and also marks the lodge's first year in Albuquerque.

"Bongiornno," said Montiletto's son Anthony, a resident of Albuquerque for 17 years and a

teacher with Albuquerque Public Schools, greeting the crowd of about 50 from a podium placed between American and Italian flags.

"Today is a very special day for us.

Italian Vice Consul Paula Quarantelli spoke of how Italians have contributed to the world "through their knowledge, through their culture and through their art."

Mayor candidate Ken Schultz said the monument exemplifies the voice of the Italian community in municipal affairs.

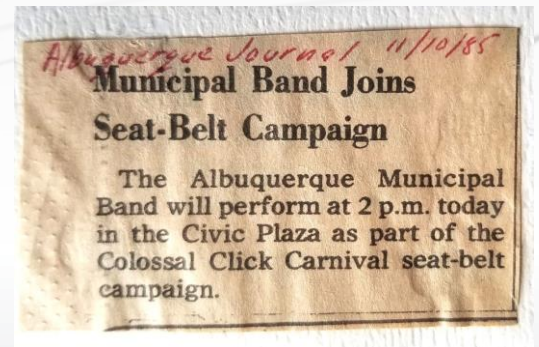
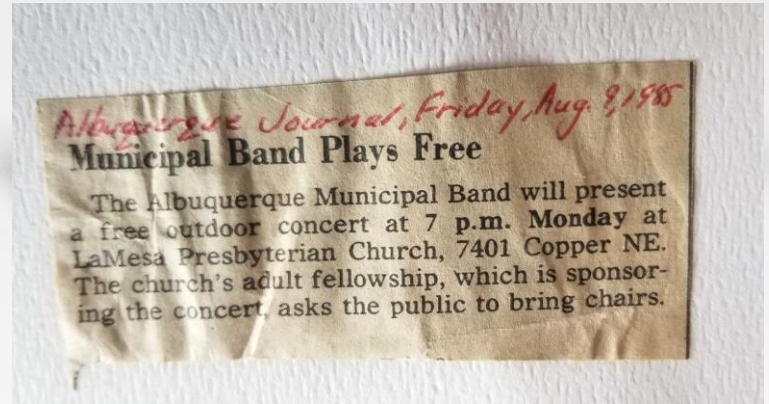
"I appreciate this and my Italian wife does as well," he added. The endless disputes over

whether Vikings or Asians or someone else first discovered America instead of Columbus perhaps have drained many people's enthusiasm for the holiday. But for Italian-Americans, especially, Columbus occupies a special place.

There was little doubt in Anthony Montiletto's mind that the explorer was given rightful credit for discovering the continent.

"If it wasn't for him and his intuitive genius, America's development would have been set back 100 years," he said.

And the simple monument dedicated Saturday will help keep the explorer in mind.

Two bands, an aerobics combo and body builders will provide entertainment for The Tribune's first "Walk Along For Fun" event to be held at 2 p.m. Sunday at the University of New Mexico Track Stadium.

Pre-registration for the fun and fitness program is near the 500 mark. Registration chairperson Mari Taylor of Gardenswartz Sportz expects well over 1,000 participants in the event.

"We have a festival atmosphere that makes this a really big event for the spring season," said Taylor.

"The Medicine Coalition of New Mexico will have a tent at the Track Stadium that will feature at least 10 medical and/or fitness exhibits. We also have many free prizes and our entertainment will be super."

Chewiwie, the entertainment chairperson, said walkers and fans will have more than "three hours of afternoon relaxation and diversion."

"The new Chewiwie Latin All-Stars and the Rhinestones will provide entertainment at the time we start registration at 1 p.m.," said Bonfield.

Registration will be taken for one hour. The 5-kilometer and 2-kilometer walks will start at 2 p.m.

"We have the Albuquerque municipal band performing at 3 p.m. and they will continue until the walk is over (about 4:15) or until after we give all our prizes away. We have the Executive Sports Club aerobic instructors performing under the leadership of Pat Sanchez. Liberty Gym body builders will be supervised by Doug Gaylor and Steve Ivey. Both groups will share the stage with the municipal band after the end of the walk."

Frank Chewiwie, who has played here for more than 25 years with Latin and salsa professional groups, is the leader and keyboard specialist for the All-Stars.

The 12-member group specializes in Puerto Rican, Cuban and other Caribbean rhythm specialties. Chewiwie organizes five-man and eight-man combos that play in nightclubs. He organized the 12-piece All-Stars for this event.

"We have a different atmosphere than most Latin bands," said Chewiwie. "We wanted this particular spot (Walk Along For Fun) to preview our fifth annual Cinco de Mayo show at Rio Bravo. We're fortunate this year to have veteran performers, especially in the expanded percussion section."

Chewiwie, a native of Mesilla Park, has had classical piano training. He has appeared at major hotels and night clubs in Albuquerque, also hospitals, schools, the Convention Center and Tingley Coliseum.

His guest appearances included appearances with Jose Feliciano, Wayne Newton, Mongo-Santa Maria, Sidro's Armada, Malo, Tierra and The Four Freshmen.

All-Star members are Tony Quinones, congas; Eddie Sanchez, timbales; Ralph "SloMo" Quinones, bongos; Victor Rodriguez and Papo Santiago, percussion and chorus; Pete Gabaldon, trap drums; Danny Trujillo, bass guitar; Luis Smoothie Soto and John Truit, tenor saxophones; Marty Cariucci and Chuck Coulter, trumpet.

The All-Stars help sponsor to the newly-formed Musicians Under Direct Distress, which provides funds for hospitalization of unemployed musicians.

The Rhinestones singing group lists Joan Griffin, Denise Brissey and Kathy Gutierrez-Ball.

Bruce Kroken is conductor for the 46-member city municipal band, but will turn over his baton to Fred Dart, a French horn soloist and former Lobo band conductor, for Sunday's program.

"This (Walk Along For Fun) is a special event for us. It precedes our regular summer series of concerts," said Dart, a member of the U.S. Air Force Band in Washington, D.C. before moving to Albuquerque.

"We are especially proud to have R.V. Taborelli, a bass drum player who is the only original member of the city municipal band.

"Bonnie Husler is our solo cornet player. We also have Carl Humble, a baritone horn, who retired from the U.S. Marine Band in Washington, D.C."

"We're getting more and more people in the community. About 45 to 50. But we still need newcomers to maintain a large membership," said Taborelli, a retired plant engineer at Lovelace Medical Center. He plays the bass drum.

"I'm the only musician left from the 15 who organized the original municipal band under conductor Robert Wolfe. Our first practice was at Monte Vista School on Oct. 21, 1968."

Other long-time members include Frank Langdon (clarinet) and Charlie Renfro (trumpet), an Albuquerque Sports Hall of Fame inductee who was the city schools recreation chief.

Other veterans include Chuck Guthrie, trumpet; Ben Weincord, clarinet; George Demas, bass drum and John Denslow, trumpet.

Mark George, former Mr. Albuquerque winner and third in the Jr. Mr. America in 1983 in New Orleans, is among the Liberty Gym body builders. Others are Paul Ferrell and female stars

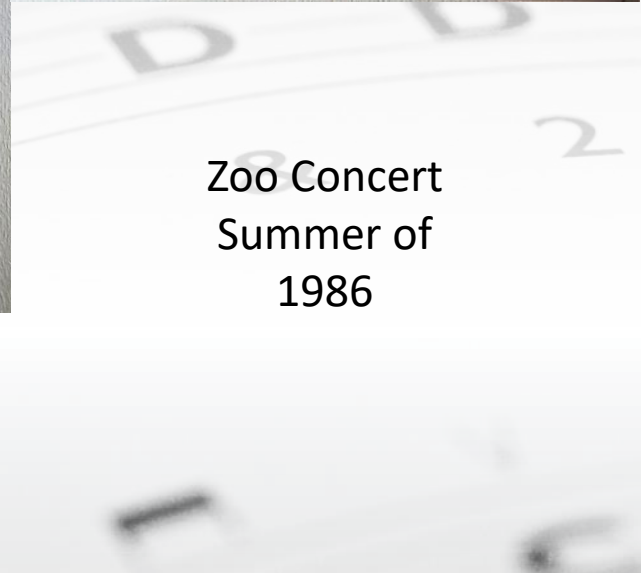

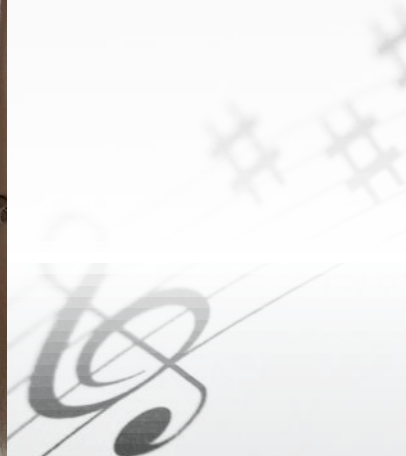
